

The tests were carried out with 74 students on the 18 September 2015. 54 Students at St Mary's RC primary school were chosen and 20 year 6 Student at Kenton High School. Using the year four class, as this class represented the bottom end of the target audience. Along with the year five class from St Mary, as this would cover the middle range of the market.

20 students from Kentons year 7, level 4 Students. As this would represent the middle to top age bracket

Six questions were asked, to before they listened to the podcast. Then four questions at the end of the session. The first two questions were on the look of pod, and the look of the website. These were the results and conclusions gained from this primary research



With the four age groups tested; the results showed that out of the 74 students, 58 said yes, 1 said no and 15 said maybe. This shows that the characters design and visual appeal, along with the online back story (about me page) appealed to the core TA with mixed feelings for the lower and upper ages in the TA – Yes percentage stands at 78%,




With the four age groups tested; the results showed that out of the 74 students, 64 said yes, No one said no and 10 said maybe. This shows that the simplistic approach in design, alongside the continuation of the Pod theme appealed to the core TA. With mixed feelings for the lower and upper ages in the TA – Yes percentage stands at 86%,

At this point in the test the year four class, listened to the Anglo-Saxon History Pod. The year five class, listened to the ancient Egyptian History Pod. Where the year 7 class, tested the Anglo-Saxon Pod as a listening style project with in an English lesson.

The audio was played out through the website using normal (if not below standard) school whiteboard monitors. All students had the relevant Pod sheet, with the instructions explained before the Pod was played. They were encouraged to listen more than fill out the sheet.

The next four questions were asked to the students once they had listened to the full 'History Pod'



With the four age groups tested; the results showed that out of the 74 students, 48 said yes, 2 said no and 24 said maybe. From these results you can definitely see where the bottom of the TA, the middle (core) and the top upper scale of the TA sits. As you can see from the charts, the bottom and upper end of the TA, swing toward the maybe answer, where the core stick firmly with their yes answer. This shows that there is a dedicated group of listeners within the TA, keeping the overall percentage of yes answers to 64% in favour. With 32% undecided with a maybe answer.


Q4: Did you learn anything new from the recording? For this question it was a simple yes or no answer.



With the three age groups tested; the results showed that out of the 74 students, 66 said yes, 8 said no. This result shows that this form of educational podcasting, is an effective way for students to learn something new (be it big or small chunks). Even the bottom of TA, which recorded a yes vote of 26 (this is a percentage of 35%) students in the class said they learnt something new while listening to the History Pod. This result alongside the teacher's feedback, shows that this is an effective tool that should be looked into more, within the educational system. The yes percentage stands at 89% of students tested

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Q5: Would you listen to more History Pods in the school?



With the four age groups tested; the results showed that out of the 74 students, 60 said yes, 14 said no. This is an impressive result, showing that 81% of the students surveyed would like to listen to more shows on the History Pods website. The students that answered no fell into the predicted age group at the bottom and top of the TA (Years 4 & 7). Only one in the 9 year-old brackets also said no.

Conclusion

This information shows that the History Pods website can be used as a teaching aid, as it was designed for. With the bottom target audience age of eight years old (year four classes), finding it a little-less appealing. This can be put down to their inability to sit for more than a period of eight minutes upwards. To help with this, all Pods have been split into two parts and the addition of Pea Pod recordings added (Short recordings with bursts of information that are under 6 munities long)

The tops end of the TA (year 7s) had mixed reviews as well, but this can be put down to the fact that they covered the Anglo-Saxons in primary school. Once the website contains more KS3 subject matter, this will then engaged the Top TA.

From the results above it also shows that our core age group (years 5 and 6) have engaged and enjoyed the History Pods and is an effective teaching/listening tool that can be used with in a school environment.

The last question was a chance for the students to say what they liked or disliked about the 'History Pod'.
